







Features and Cues

- ✓ Raise the tongue tip up to the bump behind the top front teeth and push to release a small burst of air.
- ✓ Voice is turned OFF for /t/.

Need More Help?

Prolong the "ee" vowel and push up under the student's chin to help them raise their tongue and briefly stop the airflow to make /t/ ("eat").

Common Errors

- Omissions (e.g. "ba-" for "bat")
- **x** /k/ or /d/
- Interdental errors

Classroom Strategies

- **1.** Model correct speech in response to some of the student's errors. Use emphasis and point to your mouth to highlight the corrected sound ("What <u>time</u> is it?").
- 2. Point out the different sounds in print (e.g. "Look, 'tape' has your practice sound.").
- **3.** Create a small list of functional, key words for you and your student to practice together in their classroom routines. Write the words on a cue card or sticky note as a reminder.
 - a. Can you think of any words that you use in your daily lessons that contain /t/?
 - b. Does the student have a classmate whose name contains /t/?
 - c. Are there any weekly vocabulary or spelling words that contain /t/?
- **4.** Offer choices for correct responding to discussion questions (e.g. "Does 4 + 4 equal 'eigh' or 'eigh<u>t</u>'?"). Place emphasis on the correct sound.
- **5.** Remember to acknowledge the student's attempts to communicate. Show interest in what they are saying and give them extra time to respond, as needed.
